

Our Source of Courage...

"But if not, be it known to you, O king, that we will not serve your gods and we will not worship the golden statue that you have set up."

(Daniel 3:18)

Dear Friends.

I read today that a young man in Illinois, the valedictorian of his high school class was told by administrators that he could not give his speech unless he removed religious references. Sam Blackledge declined because he knew the whole basis of the speech was to encourage his friends and extended school community to follow Jesus. Here is an excerpt from the address he intended to share with the class of 2018 and their families. "

"Where did evil, justice, love and forgiveness converge at a moment in history? Can I take you to a hill called Calvary and show you the person of Jesus Christ? The cross of Christ shows us our own evil hearts, that we would put an innocent man there to die. Christ came to show us God's justice in dealing with the unfairness of the world. The cross demonstrates to us the very love of God who died in our place and how we find, at the end of the day, that without His forgiveness, we would never make it. Graduates, I hope your life is devoid of evil, full

of justice, full of love and full of forgiveness."

Unfortunately he was unable to give the speech at the time he had planned to, but thankfully, as it turns out. Sam's freedom to

thankfully, as it turns out, Sam's freedom to communicate this message is protected in the

United States by our constitution.

In every age there are powerful forces pressuring us to deny our Lord.

Sam's story which is still unfolding this year in the United States should sound familiar, as it may remind us of another young man named Daniel in the Bible. When the ancient Babylonians captured Jerusalem roughly 600 years before the coming of Christ, they handpicked several Jewish young men to serve in King Nebuchadnezzar's court. These young men faced enormous pressure to conform to the ways of life found in Babylon. Daniel and his friends were expected to obey the dictates of the king no matter how unreasonable. This would prove an impossible task for these young who desired to remain faithful to the Lord and His ways. For the man-made rules of Babylon often conflicted with God's law. (To learn more, read especially Daniel chapter 1-3 and 6)

Throughout the course of their lives, Daniel and his friends would learn in one desperate situation after another, that the God they worshipped could always be trusted. They, and more than one king, discovered there was a greater King who ruled every corner of the world. In the coming weeks we will meet various people in the Bible who courageously followed the Lord regardless of the cost, wherever He led. Through the examples of Daniel and people like Sam, may we be inspired to trust the Lord even when life is hard.

We have **Z** Expressions of Caring:

C.C.C. = Congregational Care Contact

1-1 = One-on-One Care Givers

The Role of the C.C.C.: To engage with Congregants and act as an additional contact between the Pastor/Staff and the congregation. C.C.C.'s are identified by wearing Name tags, and are assigned sections of the Sanctuary or Café. They will be given contact cards, and are encouraged to greet others regulary, be aware of attendance patterns, and reach out when someone has been absent outside of their regular pattern. They will assist in the filling out and handling of the Pew cards as well. Some C. C. c.'s have also agreed to help distribute Holy Communion, Flowers, cookies and prayer shawls to our homebound members as well. This group is encouraged to meet monthly(currently on the 1st Thursday of the month at 7:30pm) for planning, support and updates.

The Role of the 1-1: One-on-One caregivers are currently trained as Stephen Ministers (50+ hours of study). They are equipped to meet with individuals weekly - (or as needed) to offer Christian help to work through acute crisis or grief. They are not trained counselors. Their role is an extension of the Pastor's care. They are required to meet monthly(currently on the 3rd Thursday of the month at 7:30pm) for support and accountability. Some 1-1's have also agreed to assist in the handling of pew cards as well.

Once we get closer to fair time, we will be looking for cookies, baked goods, fudge, candies and other perishables. More info will be coming on that in the fall.



SUMC Administrative Board Meeting April 10, 2018 **Meeting Minutes**

In Attendance: Nancy Dawson, Deb Grehn, Carol Goodwin, Kim Grehn, Jane Zadnik, Don Wilby, Rev. Dick Thompson, J.T. Himmelstein, Terry Marshall, Rev. John Marshall, Jim Hoagland, Bill Hyde, Jennifer Dupont.

Opening Prayer/Reading of Vision and Mission Statements:

The meeting was called to order at 7:37 p.m. by Chairperson Deb Grehn. There was a prayer by Pastor John and Kim Grehn read SUMC's Mission and Vision Statements.

Acceptance of Outstanding Minutes:

Draft minutes from the February 13, 2018 Administrative Board meeting were reviewed.

There was a motion (Bill Hyde, Terry Marshall) to accept the February 13, 2018 Administrative Board minutes as drafted. All were in favor and the motion carried.

Unfinished Business:

Bill Hyde reported back to the group on an article previously shared by Margaret Callaway about churches being taxed for the use of natural gas. Bill clarified that SUMC gets its natural gas from CT Natural Gas and this company is not named in the article. He has inspected our bills and is confident that the issue raised in the article does not apply to our church.

Committee Reports:

Memorials: Jane Zadnik reported that no new memorial funds have been received in the past month.

Outreach: Pastor Dick reported on activities of the Outreach Commission. A total of \$2,053 was received from the special UMCOR offering. MAD MACC Shopper offerings are being taken April 8 and April 15. Plans are moving along well for the Rise Against Hunger event and there will be a Rebuilding Together event on April 28. We'll be doing blankets for Mother's Day again this year and around Father's Day, there will be a special focus/collection for providing wells and drinking water. We are working to continue our support for Washington School in the midst of declining activities there. This includes "food suitcases" in partnership with Trinity Covenant and potential assistance with this year's graduation party.

Next Generation Ministries: J.T. Himmelstein reported on his progress in seminary. After this semester, he will have eight more courses to take to complete his degree and his anticipated graduation date is May 2020. Twelve youth and three leaders attended Winter Retreat February 23-25 at Monadnock. Special thanks to Jeff Keift for help with the driving. The Youth took part in the Lenten prayer service and set up tables for a recent funeral luncheon. They visited a trampoline park a few weeks ago. The next mission trip is to Portland, ME July 22-27. Teen and young adult Bible classes are going well.

Director of Ministries / Education: Terry Marshall reported that we had a successful Easter Celebration activity between the services on March 25, with some new families in attendance. Confirmation classes will be held starting April 22 and Confirmation will be held June 10 at the 10:00 a.m. service, with a picnic to follow. VBS (August 20-24) is being advertised and new volunteers are needed in several areas. The new Directory is complete and most copies have been distributed. Shut-ins will receive copies of the Directory. Congregational Care activities have included delivery of plants at Easter and delivery of home communion to those who request it. Pew cards are being used to facilitate communication of needs. The Congregational Care Contacts (CCC's) are becoming more active – meeting monthly, passing out cards describing services offered and looking at other activities for us to get to know each other.

Trustees: Jim Hoagland reported for the Trustees. There is ongoing maintenance underway at 20 Hartford Road and 48 Hartford Road and some tree work is being done on church properties. A meeting was held with the Manchester Zoning Commission on our parking plan. A lot line adjustment is necessary to separate the 21 Hartford Road driveway and allow more property on the church side for 13-14 paved spaces and 8 limited mobility spaces near the elevator. This is a regulatory process and will take time. We have requested that the recently installed Historical District sign be moved farther toward the Great Lawn because it is limiting visibility at the church driveway exit. Professional cleaning of the church kitchen is under consideration by the Trustees.

Treasurer's Report: Bill Hyde reported that income for March is below budget by \$5,300, but year-to-date income is above budget. Expenses are all paid and in line with budget. We have paid 25% of our Mission Shares through March.

UMW Representative: Jennifer Dupont reported that UMW is working on their budget, including designing a request form for audit trail purposes. They are beginning to plan for the Fair.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC): Nancy Dawson reported that SPRC met in March. This was the first meeting for two new members, Lou Carpenter and Rodean Gyrokeri. The Committee discussed potential doctrinal changes within the United Methodist Church and how changes could potentially impact our Staff. In response to a question, Nancy stated that the draft of a Church Covenant is still under discussion.

Pastor's Report: Pastor John stated that a recent need (rent support) was addressed through the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. This Fund currently contains less than \$500 and donations are needed. Church members responded very well supporting fellowship events for two recent funerals. There have been two recent baptisms and another baptism is scheduled. Easter service attendance was high, with approximately 400 at the 9:30 service and 90 in the Café. There are ten in the Confirmation class, which is great!

Lay Leaders: Don Wilby expressed his thanks to the Cub Scouts for raking our property on April 7. Deb Grehn noted a couple of upcoming events: April 21 "Connecting Neighbors – Preparing for Natural Disasters or Human Caused Threats" in Northampton, and May 4 "A Mindset for Renewal" in Springfield.
